PROGRAM NOTE

The music by MSM faculty member, Guggenheim Fellow, Sunnyside Records Artist, composer, and flutist Jamie Baum, composed for her critically acclaimed Jamie Baum Septet+ and guest vocalist, uses texts by women poets to illustrate the palpable, personal, and communal experience of living in the time of COVID-19 and the simultaneous socio-political movement, as well as its abrupt transformation of our world. From her Hell's Kitchen, New York perspective (initially the U.S. epicenter of COVID-19), Baum looked to other artistic platforms for hope, solace, and inspiration. She chose women poets of various ages and ethnicities and utilized those poems in some cases as inspiration, and in others as spoken word, lyrics, or transformed into effects for each composition. Examples include: "What Kind of Times Are These" and "In Those Years" by Adrienne Rich, "My Grandmother in the Stars" by Naomi Shihab Nye, "An Old Story" by Tracy K. Smith, and "sorrow song" by Lucille Clifton. These poems reflect and suggest, both symbolically and vividly, how we arrived at this moment, how we might manage during this time, and how we might hope to learn and emerge from the experience.

ABOUT THE ARTIST

Jamie Baum, flute

Jamie Baum is a New York-based jazz composer, flutist, and educator; a Sunnyside Records artist; and a 2014 Guggenheim Fellow. She has toured in over 35 countries, working and recording with renowned jazz artists ranging from Paul Motian, Randy Brecker, Tom Harrell, Dave Douglas, Fred Hersch, Louis Cole, and Roy Hargrove to Mick Goodrick, V. M. Bhatt, Anthony Braxton, and Wadada Leo Smith. Her awards and honors include 12 Jazz Journalists Association nominations and annual listings in *DownBeat* International Critics Polls since 1998, as well inclusion in *Huffington Post*'s "Twenty-Five Great Jazz Flute Performances" and *JazzTimes*'s "10 Essential Jazz Flute Albums". She's received praise for six CDs as a leader and four with her Septet+ of 20 years, and has appeared on over 50 recordings as a sidewoman. Jamie toured as a U.S. State Department–Kennedy Center Jazz Ambassador between 1999 and 2003, and has since been sponsored frequently by the State Department while on her own overseas tours. She has been on the faculty at Manhattan School of Music since 2006 and a clinician for Altus Flutes/KHS America since 1995.
