ABOUT THE COACHES

Raphael Fusco (PC 'OI)

Italian-American keyboardist, composer, and pedagogue Raphael Amadio Fusco is acclaimed as "a lively player and fine improviser" (*Los Angeles Times*), "one of the most outstanding composers of his generation" (*El Mundo*), and "a leader in the opera world today" (*Operawire*).

Mr. Fusco has performed with the Chamber Orchestra of Philadelphia, New York Philharmonic, American Ballet Theatre, Gotham Chamber Opera, Graz Opera, and Amherst Early Music Festival, and has toured with Grammy Awardwinning saxophonist Branford Marsalis. He was twice artist-in-residence at the Piccola Academia di Montisi, creating compositions on a world-class collection of historical keyboard instruments.

Fusco's genre-crossing compositions have been commissioned by ensembles including the Chamber Orchestra of Philadelphia, Cecilia Chorus of New York, I Cantori New York, and the German Forum. Premieres have taken place in Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, St. Bavo Kerk Haarlem, Casa Milà in Barcelona, Église de Saint Séverin in Paris, Dvorak House in Prague, and Teatro Titano in San Marino. In 2022, he conducted the world premieres of his *An American Requiem* in the Herz Jesu Kirche of Graz and his cantata *La contesa canora* in Lucca, Italy. He conducted the premieres of his operas *Der Telefonist* in Oldenburg, Germany, and *inSOMNIA* in Amberg, Germany ("a multifaceted, atmospheric sound-painting," *Mittelbayerische Zeitung*) in 2021. His debut album *REMIXED* featuring original compositions for solo piano was praised for its "stunning sonic ideas" (*Jazz Corner*).

Mr. Fusco has won awards from the Aliénor International Harpsichord Competition, American Prize for Music, NATS, Fyfe Choral Prize, Phoenix Boys Choir, and Notre Dame University, as well as grants from the National Italian American Foundation and Exploring the Metropolis. His compositions are published by Universal Edition Vienna and Verlag Ries & Erler Berlin.

A passionate educator, Raphael has given guest lectures and masterclasses at the Sorbonne University, Escuela Superior de Canto in Madrid, Boston University, Opera Lucca Festival, and Classic Lyric Arts Festival in Italy. He studied at the G. Verdi Conservatory of Turin, Paris Schola Santorum, Vienna Conservatory, and Manhattan School of Music, and holds degrees from the Mannes College of Music. Since 2019, Fusco has been Senior Artist at the Institute for Music Theater at the Kunstuniversität in Graz, Austria, where he is pursuing a doctoral degree in artistic research. Fusco's dissertation explores empathy and expressive agency in vocal composition. raphaelfusco.com

Sherry Sylar

The Associate Principal Oboe of the New York Philharmonic since 1984, Sherry Sylar served as Acting Principal during the during the 2005–06 and 2018–19 seasons and has also served as guest principal oboe for other major orchestras including the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Boston Symphony Orchestra, the Orchestre Philharmonique de Radio France, the Orpheus Chamber Orchestra, the St. Louis Symphony, and the Minnesota Orchestra. Prior to joining the New York Philharmonic she was a member of the Louisville Orchestra and was among the select group of Philharmonic musicians who joined the orchestra that Leonard Bernstein conducted in the historic Freedom Concert at the falling of the Berlin Wall in 1989, which she counts as one of the highlights of her career.

As a featured soloist with the New York Philharmonic, she has performed Haydn's Sinfonia Concertante in B-flat major, conducted by Jeffrey Kahane, and Bach's Concerto for Violin and Oboe with the Orchestra's Principal Associate Concertmaster Sheryl Staples, conducted by Kent Nagano. In 1989 she was soloist in the Orchestra's performances and recording of Handel's Oboe Concerto in G minor, Zubin Mehta conducting. She also serves as the New York Philharmonic's oboe d'amore player, and she earned praise from the New York Times for her solos on that instrument during the orchestra's 2013 The Bach Variations: A Philharmonic Festival. In March 2016 she performed the World Premiere of Pablo Furman's Concerto for Oboe and Strings with the San Jose Chamber Orchestra, and later reprised the work in Poland and in Tampa, Florida.

An avid performer of chamber music, she appears often in the concerts of the New York Philharmonic Ensembles and has participated in the Aspen and Grand Teton Music Festivals. She played Luciano Berio's Sequenza VIIa for solo oboe at Jazz at Lincoln Center's Rose Theater as part of the New York Philharmonic's celebration of the late composer in 2008.

Sylar gives master classes for oboists internationally and was invited to China as a judge for the Beijing National Orchestra's first-ever auditions. A native of Chattanooga, Tennessee, she earned her Bachelor's degree at Indiana University and her Master's degree from Northwestern University. She formerly taught at the University of Evansville in Indiana, and is currently on the faculty of Manhattan School of Music. Her CD, *Oboe Dolce*, includes solo oboe and chamber music featuring Principal Bassoon Judith LeClair, Principal Viola Cynthia Phelps, Harriet Wingreen, Jonathan Feldman, Yi Fang Wang, and Norman Weiss.
