There's two boys silhouetted in the taillight as the car fades. One fumbles for the other, their heads two quarters folding through the evening. It's already the 16th in Italy, that's right. Somehow I'd almost forgotten.

## **PROGRAM NOTES**

### *Nocturne* (2023) Chongguang Guan

The quiet night is romantic and always makes people think a lot.

The lights on the other side of the Hudson bloom on the river, like a neon mirror that makes the night no longer lonely.

### *Constellations* (2023–24) Ked Adams

This piece takes considerable inspiration from the work of Thomas Adès. While I primarily work in just intonation with a focus on harmony and tuning, this piece explores musical proportionality in the metric aspects of the music. The meter changes and various superimposed rhythms are the result of applying harmonic logic.
