PROGRAM NOTES

Dances from *Estancia*, Op. 8a **Alberto Ginastera**

Ginastera described his own creative evolution as falling into three basic periods: objective nationalism, subjective nationalism, and neo-expressionism. In his objective nationalistic compositions Ginastera presented Argentine folk materials directly and overtly, though he rarely quoted literally. His ballet *Estancia* represents this early period. It was commissioned in 1941 for the American Ballet Caravan by Lincoln Kirstein, who wanted a work based on Argentine country life. 1941 was a significant year for the composer—he was appointed professor of composition at the National Conservatory, was chosen chair of music at the Liceo Militar General San Martin, and married former fellow student Mercedes de Toro.

Estancia was dedicated to Kirstein, but the staged production had to be postponed because the American Ballet Caravan disbanded in 1942. Nonetheless, a highly successful concert performance of the suite of dances from the ballet was given at the Teatro Colón in Buenos Aires on May 12, 1943, which won great recognition for Ginastera as a nationalistic voice. Eventually, in 1952, the work was staged, at the same theater, with choreography by Michel Borovsky.

The story of the ballet involves a young man from the village who must prove himself by laboring on a large ranch ("estancia") to win the love of a country girl. The Four Dances consist of three sections from the ballet's second scene and the last from the fifth and final scene. The first, Los trabadores agricolas (The peasant farmers), is a vigorous dance with accented, syncopated, chordal patterns that suggest the energetic efforts of the farmers harvesting wheat.

Danza del trigo (Dance of the wheat), which actually precedes the Dance of the Peasant Farmers in the complete ballet, sets the tranquil morning scene of haystacks, windmills, and wheat in the sun just before harvest. Plaintive flute and violin solos enhance the peaceful atmosphere.

The energetic rhythms return in *Los peones de hacienda* (*The farmhands of the estate*), in which the gauchos, along with the country girl, tame wild horses. Salient horn and timpani parts add to the driving quality.

Danza finale (Malambo) concludes the ballet on the morning of the next day, after the young couple has shared a tender romance the previous evening. The malambo was traditionally danced by gauchos as a test of manhood—the one left standing was declared the winner. In the ballet the dance begins with

introductory sparkle and picks up momentum with its accented, repetitive dance rhythms, enlivened by brass pronouncements, colorful piano glissandos (slides), occasional instrumental "cheers," and full percussion section in which the xylophone is prominent.

Symphony No. 3 in C Major, Op. 52 **Jean Sibelius**

Sibelius's Third Symphony went through a long and difficult gestation period, and its premiere was even postponed because the composer could not meet the deadline he had arranged. Sibelius first mentioned work on the Symphony in a letter to his friend Axel Carpelan dated September 21, 1904. He returned to it on and off during the next few years, in between moving into his new home at Järvenpää; revising his Violin Concerto; making trips to England, France, and Germany; and composing—incidental music for *Pelléas och Mélisande* and *Belshazzar's Feast*, symphonic fantasy *Pohjola's Daughter*, songs, and piano pieces.

The composer put himself under great pressure by accepting the invitation of the Royal Philharmonic Society of London to conduct the new Symphony in the spring of 1907. He even refused several requests for compositions in late 1906 and early 1907 in order to finish it, but still could not get the work ready in time. On September 10, 1907, his publisher Lienau begged him to send the finale as the other two movements had already been engraved. The Symphony was finally premiered later that month at a concert in Helsinki on which Sibelius also conducted *Pohjola's Daughter* and *Belshazzar's Feast*. The London Philharmonic Society's long-awaited premiere had to wait until the following spring and by then Sibelius had conducted the Third Symphony in St. Petersburg, Moscow, and Stockholm.

Critics in Finland, Sweden, Russia, and England were surprised and not greatly pleased by the work. They no doubt expected a lush, Romantic work along the lines of Sibelius's first two symphonies or a virtuoso piece for orchestra such as *Pohjola's Daughter*. The composer himself thought highly of the Third Symphony describing, it as "the most beloved and least fortunate of my children." Sadly it remains one of his least performed symphonies.

The Third has been, and still is, described as Sibelius's most Classical symphony owing to its approach to form and its more transparent texture—Sibelius used only a moderate-sized orchestra. The first movement represents the composer's clearest example of sonata form, yet within it one finds the organically unified thematic treatment and unconventional key relationships that impart that

special Sibelius quality. The interplay between modal and major-minor scales helps to define the composer's unique sound. Characteristic pedal points and folklike drones are also prevalent; here and again in the second movement one is reminded of Mahler's *Wayfarer* and *Wunderhorn* songs and symphonies.

One way Sibelius achieves organic unity is by introducing a theme that has already been prepared by an earlier motive. The second theme in this opening movement is anticipated by a carefully shaped motive in the winds and horns at the end of the first theme group. In addition, the sixteenth-note figure appearing first in the wind utterances in the first theme group, gains prominence when isolated in the second theme melody, and becomes important in the ensuing ostinato-like passages. The coda is interesting for its new-sounding theme, which actually stems from the closing group of the exposition. The movement ends with a firm plagal ("Amen") cadence that adds something ecclesiastical to the general pastoral impression.

The gentle slow movement derives much of its interest from shifting accents and play between duple and triple divisions of the 6/4 and 3/2 meters. Sibelius chose a highly remote key (G-sharp minor) to contrast with the key of the outer two movements (C major). Another religious association is conjured up by the choralelike writing for the winds at the movement's close, which is an outgrowth of fragments they had played earlier in the movement. It may have been a passage for cellos divided into three different parts in this movement that prompted the young Prokofiev, who had heard the first performance in St. Petersburg, to write for solo cello in an orchestration exercise, thereby incurring the wrath of his teacher Rimsky-Korsakov. "Why do you use a solo cello here?" asked Rimsky. "Because at this point I do not want the effect of all the cellos playing," replied Prokofiev. "Oh really! Have you ever heard solo cellos?" "Yesterday, in the Sibelius Symphony." "God in heaven! Sibelius! Why listen to Sibelius? Isn't the second subject of the *Ruslan Overture* good enough for you?"

Sibelius once characterized the third and last movement as "the crystallization of ideas from chaos." Formally this movement is the most original and complex of the Symphony, resulting from a fusion of scherzo and finale. The two distinct sections are comprised of a sonata-form scherzo in 6/8—exposition and development only—and, in place of a recapitulation, a second section or finale in 4/4. The growth and emergence of the finale's main theme is truly impressive. Related to fragments that have gone before in the "scherzo," the theme builds to an apotheotic, hymnlike close.

ABOUT THE ARTISTS

George Manahan (BM '73, MM '76), Conductor

George Manahan is in his 14th season as Director of Orchestral Activities at Manhattan School of Music, as well as Music Director Emeritus of the American Composers Orchestra. He served as Music Director of the New York City Opera for 14 seasons and was hailed for his leadership of the orchestra. He was also Music Director of the Richmond Symphony (VA) for 12 seasons. Recipient of Columbia University's Ditson Conductor's Award, Mr. Manahan was also honored by the American Society of Composers and Publishers (ASCAP) for his "career-long advocacy for American composers and the music of our time." His Carnegie Hall performance of Samuel Barber's *Antony and Cleopatra* was hailed by audiences and critics alike. "The fervent and sensitive performance that Mr. Manahan presided over made the best case for this opera that I have ever encountered," said the *New York Times*.

Mr. Manahan's guest appearances include the Orchestra of St. Luke's as well as the symphonies of Atlanta, San Francisco, Hollywood Bowl, and New Jersey, where he served as acting Music Director for four seasons. He has been a regular guest with the Curtis Institute and the Aspen Music Festival and has appeared with the opera companies of Seattle, Philadelphia, San Francisco, Chicago, Santa Fe, Paris, Sydney, Bologna, St. Louis, the Bergen Festival (Norway), and the Casals Festival (Puerto Rico). His many appearances on television include productions of *La bohème*, *Lizzie Borden*, and *Tosca* on PBS. The *Live from Lincoln Center* telecast of New York City Opera's production of *Madama Butterfly*, under his direction, won a 2007 Emmy Award.

George Manahan's wide-ranging recording activities include the premiere recording of Steve Reich's *Tehillim* for ECM; recordings of Edward Thomas's *Desire Under the Elms*, which was nominated for a Grammy; Joe Jackson's *Will Power*; and Tobias Picker's *Emmeline*. He has conducted numerous world premieres, including Charles Wuorinen's *Haroun and the Sea of Stories*, David Lang's *Modern Painters*, Hans Werner Henze's *The English Cat*, Tobias Picker's *Dolores Claiborne*, and Terence Blanchard's *Champion*.

He received his formal musical training at Manhattan School of Music, studying conducting with Anton Coppola and George Schick, and was appointed to the faculty of the school upon his graduation, at which time the Juilliard School awarded him a fellowship as Assistant Conductor with the American Opera Center. Mr. Manahan was chosen as the Exxon Arts Endowment Conductor of the New Jersey Symphony the same year he made his opera debut with the Santa Fe Opera, conducting the American premiere of Arnold Schoenberg's *Von Heute auf Morgen*.

Harry Ning (BM '25, MM '27), trombone

Harry Ning is an active tenor and alto trombonist based in New York City and China. He finished his Bachelor of Music Degree in Classical Tenor Trombone Performance from Manhattan School of Music in 2025. Harry was a finalist of the 2024 ITA Alto Trombone Competition and placed 4th in the ITA Lewis Van Haney Philharmonic Prize. He is also a fellow of the Aspen Music Festival and School in 2025. Harry is now in his first year of his Master of Music degree in Orchestral Performance with Colin Williams.

In addition to Maestro Manahan, the orchestras work regularly with Leonard Slatkin, Distinguished Visiting Artist in Conducting and Orchestral Studies, and guest conductors such as Joshua Gersen, Mei-Ann Chen, and JoAnn Falletta.
